hina is the third largest country in the world after Russia and Canada. However, it has by far the biggest population. Almost 1.3 billion people live in China (1 billion is 1,000 million). The capital of China is Beijing. In the centre of Beijing is the Forbidden City, where the Emperors of China lived for 500 years. Most Chinese people speak Mandarin.

China is so big that it has different types of weather depending on the region. The weather is very cold in the north and very hot in the south of the country. There are huge deserts in Western China. The Gobi Desert, which is the world's fifth largest desert, is found in this region. The Himalayas, the highest mountain range in the world (Mount Everest is in the Himalayas), run along the Chinese border.



Tea is an important drink in China. Pouring tea for someone else is a sign of respect. Tea ceremonies are an important ritual in China.

Chinese writing is quite different to what is used in Ireland. There are many different characters in their alphabet, so learning to read and write is not easy.

Letter Ban!


- 1. Ask someone to choose a letter from the alphabet.
